This report focuses on how families/ social groups supervise their children at beaches in the Auckland region. The research is based on surveys undertaken at 18 beaches. Key recommendations appear on pages 35-36 and focus on the importance of close and constant supervision as a minimum - even in seemingly benign conditions, constant alertness to changing conditions, what to reasonably expect of lifeguards etc.

There are sections on: 'in the bathtub', 'in the pool', 'at the beach' and 'in the ocean, rivers and lakes'. There is an emphasis on active supervision (e.g. hands kept on babies in baths at all times), the value of pool fencing, swimming between the flags, correctly fitted lifejackets, the value of knowing CPR and first aid etc.

This item includes a multi-lingual DVD targeting Asian and New Migrant Communities. One goal of the Drowning Prevention Strategy is for a water safety culture to be established in New Zealand (DPS p.16), however many new migrants & visitors do not share the same culture, or indeed the same beliefs, attitudes, values and behaviours when it comes to being in and around water. The DVD is viewable in English, Chinese, Cantonese, Korean, and promotes water safety in four key areas – pool, beach, boat, and rock fishing. It demonstrates 'best practice' water safety showing correct safety equipment to wear and use, and simple procedures that can make all the difference in an emergency, such as carrying a mobile phone in a waterproof bag, wearing a lifejacket, supervising children and swimming between the flags at the beach. A translated handbook of safety tips is also included. Asians are the fastest growing ethnic community in New Zealand, a community that has almost doubled in size since 2001 (2006 Census) and a community that is over-represented in the national drowning statistics. It is hoped that this DVD, an important project between WaterSafe Auckland, Water Safety New Zealand and ACC, will assist in familiarising these at-risk communities with the nature of our aquatic environment in order for them to enjoy the outdoors without placing themselves at risk. This record describes a collection of five printed out photos of a community education kit but we do not hold a copy of the kit. It is made up of a 7 m x .6 m rollable plastic sheet which is marked with one meter markings (at 1-6 meters) and the message 'Check where the kids are - there's no going back!' and 'check', 'supervise', 'separate'. There is also a base and PVC flag/banner which is 1. 830 m x .46 m with message 'Check where the kids are - there's no going back!'. There are also 3 cut out and painted life sized figurines of 2 toddlers and a baby and there are also stickers which are intended to be used as part of the 'Well Child' visit system and a sunvisor clip. The stickers feature the main safety message and the messages: "CHECK for children before driving off, SUPERVISE children around vehicles ALWAYS, SEPARATE play areas from driveways" and refer to the Child Safety Foundation. The visor sun glasses clip features the message: 'Check where the kids are - there's no going back!' The intention is that the sheet be laid out behind a vehicle and the figurines be placed on the spaced intervals until they can be seen by the driver thus reinforcing how large the vehicle 'blind spots' are, especially when a driver is backing. As of the September 2007 launch there are 4 kits in Auckland region to be used to promote driveway runover prevention.

Papamoa School's "i Save the World" programme is aimed at getting children to school safely without using cars. It was developed with Tauranga City Council. Papamoa students travel to and from school by 'World Saving Actions' (walking, biking or bus), with a world travel theme. Every week they 'travel' to a new country, plotting progress with passports, interactive maps, flags, stickers and colourful badges. The lanyard and plastic pocket serve as the focus for earning brightly coloured pin/ buttons, cards and 'passport' stamps from the countries of the world. Year six students serve as 'World Marshals', looking after younger students' safety. Since the "i Save the World" programme was introduced, the number of children travelling to school by car has dropped 37 percent, those taking the bus has risen 55 percent, cycling has increased by 45 percent and those walking to school has jumped nearly 200 percent. Papamoa School's travel programme won top prize in the New Zealand Road Safety Innovation and Achievement Awards 2007 education category.

It is intended that the thermometer is used to test hot water from the tap to see whether it is at a temperature which wont burn a child.
